DATES TO REMEMBER April	Guiding the Direction of Quality Learning School Action Plans articulate the school's strategic work in the areas of formation, literacy and numeracy. They align with the CEDP Strategic Intent and Theory of Action. School Action Plans should be informed by school data and are for improving student learning outcomes. School Action Plans are written by schools in the school's context. The goal of these plans is to know our students better so we can teach them better.
1st - 5th Vegetable Week	Teacher Learning Plans are individual, annual professional learning plans that must align with the CEDP Strategic Intent and the school's Action Plans. They should be informed by the NSW National Professional Standards for Teachers.

At these meetings we gather with three other schools. Each school presents their data/evidence and identifies their next steps/challenges, followed by suggestions from peers about the way forward. Peer Review is a key part of the School Compliance audit process which allows all schools to view, assess and provide critical feedback on the curriculum presented by the school being reviewed. The process of Peer Review enables all schools to ensure that they are fully compliant according to NESA and CEDP requirements. A sampling approach is used to target specific Key Learning Areas and stages of learning and examine these in close detail to ensure that they are meeting syllabus requirements and overall NESA specifications. Internal Peer Review is conducted each term at a school level. It mimics the process for peer review and ensures that St Oliver's is always compliant. Professional Learning Meetings are informed by the school action plans so that the learning of the students can improve. These meetings occur on a weekly basis and are linked to the NSW National Professional Standards for Teachers. A contemporary professional learning curriculum focuses on the process and practice of learning and is grounded in students' needs identified through assessment. Module Meetings Each stage meets as a team once a week. This norm is dedicated time for the teachers to collaboratively plan and build capacity to impact the learning. It is through these tasks that good instruction can be put into place. Leadership Meetings are held once a week. The school's leadership is a shared process with group and individual roles and capacities. The leadership team meets weekly with a specific agenda. This agenda is rigorous and student, teacher and community focused. System Professional Learning is about developing each teacher's individual teaching capabilities, as a contemporary teacher. To build the capacity of the broader educati
Last day of Term 1	 Lead Teachers within each school staff work collaboratively with teacher educators and staff to build a school's capacity by directly building the capabilities of the staff in the area of Literacy or Numeracy. Teacher Educators work with schools on improving learning outcomes for all students and promoting a professional and
	rewarding working life for teachers. Teacher Educators specifically focus on building a school's capacity by directly building the capabilities of the Lead Teachers in the area of Literacy or Numeracy. Learning Leaders work alongside the Teaching Educator and school leadership team to establish and support the work of the Action Plan. They communicate regularly with the Teaching Educator about the work, support and follow-up aspects of the work as appropriate and ensure Instructional and Teacher-learning Triads are working eff effectively.

Gospel Lk 15:1-3. 11-32

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke Your brother here was dead and has come to life.

Sunday's gospel reading (Luke 15:1-3,11-32) includes one of the eleven parables unique to Luke; it is also one of the most well-known, but is often said to be misnamed in its common designation as "the Prodigal Son" (15:11-32). Many parables are similarly named in ways that appear to miss the point of their telling,

Literal Sense

The parable of the lost son is a fascinating study of Jewish culture and purity laws. The son could not have distanced himself more from Jewish custom. Firstly, he demanded his inheritance, effectively treating his father as dead. Secondly, he travels to a pagan land and then in despair finds himself feeding pigs – animals whose meat was forbidden to Jews. He knows that his actions have alienated him from his family and culture and yet when he returns, his father gives him a fine robe and a ring to wear – signs of a father claiming a son as his own.

NSW PREMIER'S READING CHALLENGE


The school holidays are a great opportunity to enjoy books! All St Oliver's children are encouraged to add to their list for the NSW Premier's Reading Challenge.

\$100 CREATIVE KIDS VOUCHERS GO LIVE

As parents begin planning for the year ahead, they can now access Creative Kids vouchers, providing them with \$100 for every school-age child to help cover the cost of enrolment for creative and cultural learning activities.

Parents can use one voucher for every school-age child per year to help meet the cost of structured creative and cultural activities, such as music lessons, languages, coding, drama and theatre, photography and graphic design.

Minister for Finance, Services and Property Victor Dominello said the NSW Government's Creative Kids program builds on the success of the Active Kids program, which is back this year, helping to reduce the cost of registration for sport and organised physical activity.

"The start of the school year is just around the corner and we are encouraging parents to get in early by jumping on the Service NSW website to register for their Creative Kids vouchers," Mr Dominello said.

"Involvement in creative and cultural learning activities is critical to a child's growth and development but the enrolment costs all add to the family budget and can be prohibitive.

"The NSW Government recognises that cost of living is a major issue for families and because of our strong budget position, we are proud to be providing this extra assistance for children to participate in these valuable creative and cultural programs.

"This program compliments the hugely popular Active Kids voucher and for a family with two children, Creative and Active Kids combined will save you \$400 a year."

There are still thousands of providers out there which could be eligible to be part of the Creative Kids program throughout 2019. The Government is calling on them to register with Service NSW so that parents can claim their vouchers with them.

Creative Kids is one of a raft of NSW Government initiatives helping to ease cost of living pressure for households.
