St Oliver Plunkett was born in Ireland on November 1, 1629. In 1647, he went to study for the priesthood in the Irish College in Rome. He taught in Rome until 1669, when he was appointed Archbishop of Armagh in Ireland. Archbishop Plunkett soon established himself as a man of peace and set about visiting his people, establishing schools, ordaining priests, and confirming thousands.

From the year 1673, there was religious persecution in Ireland, and Bishops were banned. St Oliver went into hiding, suffering a great deal from cold and hunger. He was put on trial and was sentenced to death. With deep serenity of soul, he was prepared to die, calmly rebutting the charges.

His many letters showed his determination not to abandon his people, but to remain a faithful shepherd. On October 12, 1975, he was canonised a saint. His feast day is July 1st.

St Oliver suffered much for his faith and the love of his people. Let us pray to our dear St Oliver for endurance in times of suffering and hardship.

Gospel

Lk 11:1-13

Jesus teaches the disciples to pray.

Say this when you pray:

"Father, may your name be held holy, your kingdom come; give us each day our daily bread, and forgive us our sins, for we ourselves forgive each one who is in debt to us. And do not put us to the test."

Literal Sense

Luke's version of the Lord's Prayer, which has 38 words, is another example of how a few sentences have changed history. Around 50 years after the death of Jesus, Luke's Gospel was written for the Christian community in Antioch, which was the political and cultural capital of the Roman Province of Syria. There are six major themes running throughout this Gospel: prayer, hospitality, compassion, forgiveness, the common life and care for the outsider. Most of them are expressed in the 38 words of this prayer.

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Spiritual Sense

Jesus teaches us to ask, to seek, and to knock. If we do, we are promised that we shall receive, we shall find, and doors will be opened for us.

Does this mean that prayers are a type of magic and that all we have to do is pray and we can control the outcome of the world? If not, what do you think it means?

Jesus teaches us to pray: 'Forgive us our sins, for we too forgive all who do us wrong.'

'Father' suggests a relationship that is intimate and childlike. We use many terms of endearment like this; pappa, daddy..... This prayer the 'Our Father' is intended for those who enjoy such a relationship of a Father's love because of Jesus, who called God 'Father' and who now invites us to do the same.
